This conference will focus on developments in the teaching of games in physical education and sport coaching in the Asia-Pacific region. It will provide a forum in which academics and practitioners can meet, engage in dialogue, learn and develop the teaching of games and sport in a collaborative environment. The conference will benefit teachers and coaches who are new to the Game Sense approach, and provide a comprehensive introduction to it, as well as help those who are looking for ways to improve aspects of the approach such as game design and questioning, and will equip you with new ideas to energise your teaching and coaching. Instead of having to learn the techniques of a sport, students and players learn them in the game through the use of modified games and game-like activities.
